



EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

- There were **1878** screenings across Canada and in **40** countries around the world.
- An estimated 83,000 audience members attended live events and approximately 2.5 million enjoyed a Canadian film on broadcast or online.
- 181 special guests joined us, including Jann Arden, Shawn Ashmore Barry Avrich, Liane Balaban, Pierre-Luc Brillant, Gary Burns, Sophie Deraspe, Philippe Falardeau, Colm Feore, Niv Fichman, Fab Filippo, Ann-Marie Fleming, Tasha Hubbard (Cree), Peter Keleghan, Robert Lantos, Sook-Yin Lee, Gail Maurice (Cree/Métis), Deepa Mehta, Eric Peterson, Matthew Rankin, Peter Raymont, Patricia Rozema, **Clement Virgo** and more.
- Every major broadcaster and streaming service in Canada participated, with a wide variety of programming.
- Canada's Governor General, Her Excellency the Right Honourable Mary Simon granted viceregal patronage to National Canadian Film Day again this year.
- Elbows Up For Canadian Culture, a lively, engaging town-hall style event in Toronto featured Yannick Bisson, Don McKellar, Elle-Máijá Tailfeathers (Blackfoot/Sámi), and Mary Walsh, and was hosted by Ali Hassan.
- Sneak previews of seven exciting new films in advance of their release, including It Feeds, which premiered in 20+ cinemas across the country thanks to a partnership with the Network of Independent Canadian Exhibitors and Black Fawn Distribution.

- Several communities celebrated with a full WEEK of programming, including **18** screenings presented by VIFF in Vancouver, **13** by the Yukon Film Society, 11 by Cinecenta in Victoria, BC, and many others.
- 238 French-language screenings around the world, including nearly **100** community screenings in Québec.
- **687** events showcasing Indigenous content.
- Screenings at over **50** film festivals nationwide.
- Dozens of screenings of films celebrating a major anniversary in 2025, including events with the directors in attendance for: **Sandy Wilson**'s My American Cousin (40th); John Paizs's Crime Wave (40th); Clement Virgo's Rude (30th); Gary Burns's waydowntown (25th); Philippe **Falardeau**'s La moitié gauche du frigo (The Left-Hand Side of the Fridge) (25th).
- Nearly 100 international screenings in 40 countries.
- Over **30,000** students from more than **750** schools in every province and territory participated. More than half joined our high school livestream featuring a live conversation with the team behind *The* Grizzlies, Inuk producers Alethea Arnaguq-Baril and Stacey Aglok MacDonald, and Inuk actress Anna Lambe, hosted by Jason Ryle (Anishinaabe).
- CanFilmDay generated **1400** pieces of media coverage with **13.1 million** online coverage views and **9.3 million** print circulation.
- Close to 3 million video views on social media and 6.6 million post impressions across platforms.


The size and scope of National Canadian Film Day is impossible to put into words, so we're putting it into pictures instead.

The Calgary Underground Film Festival honoured the cult classic *Crime Wave* on its 40th anniversary and welcomed director **John Paizs** for a Q&A at the Globe Cinema.

35th Anniversary: White Room

In Toronto, **Patricia Rozema** joined for a virtual Q&A for the 35th anniversary of her enigmatic drama *White Room*.









30th Anniversary: *Rude*

The Reelworld Film Festival welcomed director **Clement Virgo** and producer **Damon D'Oliveira** to commemorate the 30th anniversary of their breakout hit, *Rude*, with a Q&A moderated by the City of Toronto Film Commissioner, **Marguerite Pigott**. After the screening, Virgo and D'Oliveira were both presented with special awards and medals from the 416 Day Committee for their contributions to the film industry and Toronto community.



Sometimes, one day just isn't enough! This year, many theatres across the country decided to go even further and dedicated a full week to Canadian film screenings.


The Vancouver International Film Festival held **18 screenings** throughout the week, with tonnes of special guests joining to present their new films including director **Carl Bessai** (*Field Sketches*), actor/writer **Pirouz Nemati** (*Universal Language*, آواز بوقلمون), director **Ingrid Veninger** (*Crocodile Eyes*), producer **Leslie Bland** (*Sweet Summer Pow Wow*), and many more. They also hosted a tribute to Impact Producer Tracey Friesen, with a screening of *ScaredSacred*, featuring director **Velcrow Ripper** and producer **Cari Green**.











Meanwhile, in Whitehorse, the Yukon Film Society supersized their celebration too, with **13 screenings** across seven days, with a variety of classics and new releases including *Strange Brew, Project Grizzly, Seeds, Any Other Way: The Jackie Shane Story,* and *Night of the Zoopocalypse*.

FRENCH-LANGUAGE **PROGRAMMING**

There were **238** French-language events, and **376** screenings of French-language films. Here are just a few highlights:

Theatres Across Ouébec

We partnered with Mediafilm to offer some exciting new titles to over a dozen movie theatres in Québec. Popular films included the charming coming-of-age film La Petite et le Vieux, the quirky comedy Vil & Misérable, and Maurice, a portrait of Montréal Canadiens legend Maurice Richard, which screened at the Cinémathèque québécoise in Montréal alongside a Q&A with director Serge Giguère. In total, we had nearly 100 screenings across Québec, in all kinds of venues and communities.

Franco-Ontarian Films

This year, we profiled two powerful new Franco-Ontarian films, to serve the ongoing demand to connect communities with local content. The charming coming-of-age film *Rêver en néon* (Neon Dreaming) screened across the province in Toronto, Cambridge and Thunder Bay, as well as in Courtenay, BC, and Dalhousie, NB. The second was documentary *Johanne*, tout simplement (Simply Johanne), which screened in Ottawa, and in Toronto at a special presentation followed by a Q&A with the film's director, **Nadine Valcin**, hosted by Le Labo, centre d'arts médiatiques francophones.

Canadian Parents for French

We deepened our relationship with Canadian Parents for French (CPF), more than doubling the number of chapters, and hosting 23 events – nearly five times more than last year. With CPF, we brought French Canadian films to young people across five provinces, in schools, online, in their communities, and even in local movie theatres.





The Star of CanFilmDay

Québécois filmmaker **Sophie Deraspe** was a CanFilmDay superstar, leading four live Q&As across Toronto on the day:

- Longtime festival partner Cinéfranco hosted a packed screening of her acclaimed new film, Bergers (Shepherds)
- Toronto Arab Film Festival showcased her breakout film Antigone
- Andra Movie World presented a double feature of her earlier works: Rechercher Victor Pellerin (Missing Victor Pellerin) and A Gay Girl in Damascus: The Amina Profile

Screenings Across Alberta

The francophone community centre La Cité des Rocheuses celebrated CanFilmDay for the ninth consecutive year, holding 13 French screenings for both local schools and the wider francophone community. They activated audiences across Alberta, in Airdrie, Brooks, Calgary, Lethbridge, and Medicine Hat.

25th Anniversary Screening

In the nation's capital, we celebrated the 25th anniversary of *La moitié* gauche du frigo (The Left-Hand Side of the Fridge) with a special screening and Q&A with director **Philippe Falardeau**, co-presented by the Ottawa Film Office and the Canadian Film Institute.

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INDIGENOUS PROGRAMMING

There were **687 screenings** showcasing Indigenous content for CanFilmDay. Here are just a few highlights:

St. John's, NL

Tasha Hubbard (Cree) joined for an in-person Q&A to discuss her film Singing Back the Buffalo, after a special screening presented by The St. John's International Women's Film Festival. Her documentary was one of this year's most popular films, with 20 screenings around the world.

Halifax, NS

Hellifax Horror Fest hosted a panel discussion about the work of iconic Mi'gmaw filmmaker Jeff Barnaby, featuring Mi'gmaw horror writer Tiffany Morris, Dr. Fallen Matthews (Mi'qmaw), Dr. Kevin Chabot, and **Dr. Margaret Robinson** (Mi'qmaw) from Dalhousie University. This discussion was followed by a screening of Barnaby's iconic first feature, Rhymes for Young Ghouls.

Vancouver, BC

In Vancouver, the BC Environmental Film Festival showcased the powerful feature The Spirit Who Swims, along with a discussion featuring the film's writer and co-director **Bev Sellars**, former chief of the Xat'sull Nation.





Wahnapitae First Nation, ON

White Owl Studios in the Wahnapitae First Nation hosted a launch event for their new facility, screening *The Road to Tophet*, with the film's director **Steve Schmidt** on hand for a Q&A. The screening began with a performance from local musician **Zeegwon Shilling** (Anishinaabe), and was attended by the Chief and members of the council of the Wahnapitae First Nation as well as **Paul Lefebvre**, the Mayor of Sudbury.

Toronto, ON

At our Carlton Cinema hub, BIPOC TV and Film presented the charming dramedy Rosie, with a Q&A with the film's writer and director Gail Maurice (Cree/Métis), and leads Mélanie Bray and Keris Hope Hill (Mohawk), hosted by Tamara Podemski (Anishinaabe). At the same venue, Planet in Focus Film Festival presented the powerful documentary Yintah, with the film's co-director Michael Toledano.

At our CanFilmDay hub at Scotiabank Theatre in Toronto, the Canadian Film Fest screened the uproarious comedy Hey, Viktor!, featuring a special video introduction from director Cody Lightning (Cree), shot on the set of his second feature.

Online

We also featured a selection of online offerings, including a special tribute to the late Murray Sinclair, head of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission. The tribute featured a recorded piece from legendary director Alanis Obomsawin (Abenaki) discussing his impact, followed by her powerful short film Honour to Senator Murray Sinclair.

Over 460 schools also joined for a live conversation with Inuk creators Alethea Arnaquq-Baril, Stacey Aglok MacDonald, and Anna **Lambe** – see page 54 for more details.

We were excited to partner once again with Big Brothers Big Sisters Canada to give their "Bigs" and "Littles" the free opportunity to watch a Canadian film together! Eleven agencies across six different provinces participated, including five agencies who were new to the CanFilmDay celebration this year. Three events were held at local Cineplex theatres, and the Greater Halifax chapter screened *A Bear Named Winnie* in the auditorium of their local library, complete with fun activities like a crafting station and door prizes – they even brought in a popcorn machine!

Girl Guides and Boy Scouts

Events with the Girl Guides and Boy Scouts included screenings of specially curated shorts programmes with the 23rd Toronto Cubs, and the 113th Edmonton Guide Unit. In Welland, ON, long-time partners 20th Welland Scouts hosted a fun screening of the popular film *Butterfly Tale*. The Scouts loved the film and their special CanFilmDay moose stickers!





Retirement Networks

We also continued to expand our programming in retirement and long term care residences, working closely with partners at most major retirement chains in Canada: Sienna Senior Living, Aspira Retirement, Chartwell Retirement Residences, and others. Each of these three partners celebrated CanFilmDay as a company-wide event, including every home across the country and uniting both staff and residents through their celebration of Canadian Film. We also piloted a photo competition within each chain – see the winners on the right.

Many residences went all out to make the day special, hosting pajama parties, setting up red carpets and photo booths, and giving out snacks. Rockcliffe Care Community in Scarborough, ON, had everyone dress in a 1950s theme for their screening of *My American Cousin*, and Glen Rouge Community in Scarborough, ON, even built their own version of Maud Lewis's house, which acted as the location for their screening of *Maudie*.

Some residences also joined our pilot project to purchase vinyl banners, Canadian flag bunting, and other fun decor to enhance their event.

Network of Independent Canadian Exhibitors (NICE)

We saw our biggest numbers ever among independent cinemas, with 173 screenings in 60 theatres nationwide. Thanks to our growing partnership with NICE, that's a 20% increase in theatres, and nearly double the number of screenings we had last year! Many theatres went all in for the big day, deciding to turn CanFilmDay into CanFilmWeek.

In addition to our NICE-exclusive premiere of *It Feeds*, VIFF hosted 18 screenings, nearly all accompanied by a live Q&A (see p. 30), while at the Film.ca cinemas, the Oakville Festivals of Film and Art presented *The Grand Seduction* with a recorded introduction from director **Don McKellar** and a live Q&A with actress **Liane Balaban**.

Friends of Canadian Media

We had an enormous turnout of 1600 viewers from all across Canada for our special online screening with Friends of Canadian Media. To reinforce their advocacy work, they hosted an informative conversation between acclaimed singer-songwriter **Loreena McKennitt** and their Director of Government and Media Relations, **Sarah Andrews**. The two discussed the enduring impact of the CBC, following which participants enjoyed a screening of *Family: A Loving Look at CBC Radio*.

Art Galleries, Museums, and Artist-Run Centres

There were 47 screenings in museums, galleries, and artist-run centres this year, with many of them programming films to tie in with their mandates. Canada's Theatre Museum presented *Billy Bishop Goes to War* followed by a Q&A with the film's star, **Eric Peterson**, hosted at the historic Elgin and Winter Garden Theatres in Toronto. In Winnipeg, both Gallery 101 and La Maison des artistes visuels francophones hosted screenings of the locally-set *Universal Language* (آواز بوقلمون) to complement their exhibitions of Lebanese and Iranian-Canadian artists. In Saskatchewan, Climax Community Museum invited a neighbourhood school as well as leaders from the local Indigenous community to their screenings of *Singing Back the Buffalo*.

Libraries

There were nearly 160 screenings in libraries, taking place across ten provinces, in communities small and large. Highlights include a screening of *The Grizzlies* with Inuk actor **Natar Ungalaaq** at the Iqaluit Centennial Library in Nunavut, and appearances mentioned elsewhere in this book from filmmakers **Alan Zweig**, **Barry Avrich**, and **Mark Selby**, as well as the mascot from the Owen Sound Attack, Cubby! The Summerland Library in BC ran a bingo competition, and even made their own CanFilmDay bookmarks.

TIFF Film Circuit

There were 22 screenings of Canadian films across TIFF Film Circuit locations this year. Their programme showcased eight exciting new titles, with the most popular being *Young Werther, Bergers (Shepherds)*, and *Can I Get a Witness?*.

Love was in the air at the special 50th anniversary screening of the Oscar-winning documentary The Man Who Skied Down Everest. One couple attending the event, hosted by the Banff Centre for Arts and Creativity, came to revisit the film together after having seen it on their very first date, in 1976!

Red Deer. AB

This day of screenings organized by the Bachelor of Applied Arts in Film at Red Deer Polytechnic was a truly collaborative effort, giving students from a local high school the opportunity to programme, promote, and run their own Canadian film festival! Four feature films were screened and audiences were able to see local filmmakers who spoke between the screenings.

Kingston, ON

Canadian Forces Base Kingston screened You Are Here: A Come From Away Story as part of their Lunch and Learn series, to coincide with their exhibition, Mission Afghanistan.

The film's link to the events of September 11, 2001, was especially relevant to the base's Poppy Memorial and Portraits of Honour – two temporary exhibits dedicated to the Canadians who lost their lives in Afghanistan.

Meaford, ON

Meaford Public Library packed in four screenings on April 16! Three of their chosen films, *Ice Queens*, *Breakaway*, and *Score*: A Hockey Musical were hockey related, reflecting the community's strong support for their local teams. For the screening of *Score* the audience was joined by a special guest: Owen Sound Attack's mascot, **Cubby**!

Iqaluit, NU

The Nunatta Sunakkutaangit Museum screened *Ice Queens* with a special recorded introduction from the film's director, **Damon Kwame Mason**. The audience were also invited to test out their hockey skills and knowledge before the screening and win the chance to take home some CanFilmDay swag!

Côte Saint-Luc, QC

Over 100 people attended a special screening of *Without Precedent: The Supreme Life of Rosalie Abella* at the Côte Saint-Luc Public Library. The audience was treated to a Q&A with the film's director, **Barry Avrich**, and producer **Mark Selby**, and the Mayor and Councillors also addressed the crowd.

Montréal, QC

This screening of Ladies and Gentlemen, Mr. Leonard Cohen, hosted by Cinéma du Musée, was attended by special guest Victor Shiffman, co-creator of the exhibition Leonard Cohen: A Crack in Everything, at the Musée d'art contemporain de Montréal. The film was selected in part due to the proximity of the theatre to a large mural of Leonard Cohen, Tower of Songs, Hommage à Leonard Cohen, created by artist Gene Pendon.

This year, Cinema Haskell brought a screening of *Incendies* to their unique venue. The cinema operates out of the Haskell Free Library and Opera House, which is physically situated right on the Canada-U.S. border: audiences can sit in the United States while watching a film in Canada. Host Lorene Oikawa shared some background about her Uncle Buck Suzuki, who is profiled in the series, and spoke with special guest Masako Fukawa, author of an award-winning book about the history of the Japanese Canadian fishers. It was particularly powerful because many of the audience members shared stories of their own family connections to the fishing industry as well.

Here are just a few highlights from around the globe:

GREENLAND + PANAMA

Greenland and Panama, both of which also found their sovereignty threatened this year, stood up with Canada and celebrated CanFilmDay. In Greenland, Suialaa Arts Festival screened *Angry Inuk* at the National Library in Nuuk, and the Taseralik culture house showed the film in Sisimiut. In Panama, the Universidad de Panamá showed Richelieu and Sin Papeles (Undocumented).

Six screenings took place in Argentina, two of which were with our long-time partners at the Buenos Aires Festival Internacional de Cine Independiente (BAFICI), which presented the Argentinian premiere of the films *Paul* and Paying For It (with filmmaker Sook-Yin Lee in attendance).



Aside from RCtv, we also served another 13,000 students and nearly 300 schools with other Canadian films chosen from our school library.



Meanwhile, online, we encouraged Canadians to stand up for Canada by sitting down to watch a great Canadian film, with video ads garnering over **5.4 million views**.










CANFILMDAY WEBSITE






